 - Work through ALL the problem sets assigned in the Guide. Do not look at the solutions until you have done ALL the problems. **ALL PROBLEMS LOOK EASY ONCE YOU KNOW THE ANSWERS!!!**
 - Submit online via Laulima PRIOR TO CLASS (i.e. Thursdays before 6 pm).
- Exams: Quizzes and exam will be developed from the CFA readings as well as CFA past exams. These will serve as practice exams. On average, you will have between 2-3 minutes to answer each questions. Quizzes and exams are open book and open notes but make sure you have enough time to answer all questions.
- Class Participation: All students are expected to attend two MSF courses (Quantitative Methods on Mondays & Financial Accounting on Thursdays). Professors Liu and Wen have graciously accepted your attendance in their respective courses.

OTHER IMPORTANT STUFF:

- We will follow closely the study sessions outlined in CFA Study Guide. There are a total of 19 Study Sessions with a total of 58 Readings. We will cover those topics in BOLD this semester and the rest in Spring 2022.
- Please make sure you bring your financial calculator to every class.** HP12C (or HP 12C Platinum, 12C Platinum 25th anniversary edition, 12C 30th anniversary edition, & 12 C Prestige) or TI BAII Plus (or BA II Plus professional) are the **only ones acceptable in the CFA exam**. Please get yourself familiar with the calculator of your choice prior to start of class.
- Most important strategies to pass the CFA exam:
 - To study consistently;
 - To study from the original source (review materials such as Allen Resources, Stella, Schweiser alone will not be sufficient);
 - Prepare your own answers to LOS (Learning Outcome Statements) and do all the practice problems at the back of each study session without looking at the solutions; AND
 - An overwhelming desire to PASS the exam.
