Course project:

Students will be randomly assigned to groups of 2-4. Each group will be responsible for selecting a publicly traded company, conducting open-source research, including the most recent annual report, and presenting a 40-minute business case to adopt a new ERP system. Presentations will be conducted during weeks 6, 7, and 8. Citations are required.

Project company proposals:

During week 4 each group will present a 10-minute project proposal outlining the selected company and research to date. Proposals should include company history, preliminary analysis of most recent financial reports, and information found so far that substantiates the team's ability to obtain sufficient information to support the final course project. Recommendations whether or not to adopt an ERP and what ERP to consider are not required at this time. Citations are required.

Peer feedback:

Each student will be required to observe each presentation and fill out a peer-feedback form. In addition to feedback on the content and delivery of the project, a minimum of 5 questions probing the analysis and conclusions for each project will be required. Feedback forms will be due at 11:55 p.m. on every presentation Friday. Students are not required to provide feedback forms for their own groups.

Class and Lecture engagement:

Lectures on weeks 1, 2, 3, and 5 will be interactive. Active participation in the discussion will be expected.

No late deliverables will be accepted except for University-allowed absence, such as a life-threatening emergency. That is, no points will be given for late deliverables. Only in the case when Laulima is not accessible, late or make-up exercises or deliverables be accepted. The student can always replace the file he/she submitted before the deadline. No re-submission is allowed after the grade is posted, and there is no regrading.

Withdrawal/Drop Policy:

The student has the responsibility to withdraw from the course. Any student who does not attend class and does not drop the course will receive an "F" grade.
