- 2 In lieu of attendance grading, these are chapter practice questions with short due dates as announced in class.
- 3 Project detail to be announced after spring break (around week 11).
- Online tests (as Proctorio-enabled assignments from Connect) to be administered in class only and open-note (limited to 1 sheet for mid-terms and 2 sheets for final). No test score curving. Pre-test disclosure will be announced one week prior to the scheduled test. WARNING: Any

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- attempts to circumvent the test policies to gain unfair advantage by the student is regarded as academic misconducts or dishonesty subject to adverse grade consequences and/or disciplinary action.
- This is discretionary and is pending the result of the average course grade performance at 70% course completion for the class (TBA around 2 weeks prior to the final exam). The extra credit for this course is intended as a student privilege for those that are usually test challenged and have demonstrated satisfactory work ethics (assignments and project completion) and ethical academic behaviors for this course. As such, students must fulfill all conditional requirements (3) to be eligible for the extra credit points. This assignment will entail some quick self-study that will help students amass working application proficiency. Completion is optional.

All mid-terms and the final examination must be taken as scheduled. **WARNING**: Due to limited instructor resources following the closure of the Manoa Test Center after Fall Semester of 2024, **NO** make-up for personal reasons will be granted in general. Please review the class planner (subject to revision) regularly, as missing a scheduled test may result in a test score of -0- to the student.
